It was wonderful to be with more than 45 scholars from all over the world, including four special keynoters: Patrick Duffley, Ofelia García, Alan Huffman, and Ricardo Otheguy. We learned, discussed, and debated; we examined our history and most importantly, we looked to the future of Columbia School linguistics.


